

FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

We know the facts about Holy Week, but sometimes facts fail to reveal meaning. Sometimes that meaning is found in poetry.

Palm Sunday: G.K Chesterton (1874-1936) takes the point of view of the donkey on whose back Jesus triumphantly entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. The donkey describes himself as being perceived as the most wretched and perverse animal in all of God's creation, such that he wonders whether the devil was his creator. But the donkey knows a secret that no one in the world knows: he once was worshiped and celebrated by a crowd of thousands as he carried the true Creator of the world on his back. He may not feel significant or beautiful in himself, but because of Whom he carried, he knows what it is like to walk in triumph and to enjoy adoration.

The Donkey

When fishes flew and forests walked
And figs grew upon thorn,

Some moment when the moon was blood
Then surely I was born.

With monstrous head and sickening cry
And ears like errant wings,
The devil's walking parody
On all four-footed things.

The tattered outlaw of the earth,
Of ancient crooked will:

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The Donkey, cont.

Starve, scourge, deride me: I am dumb,
I keep my secret still.
Fools! For I also had my hour;
One far fierce hour and sweet:
There was a shout about my ears,
And palms before my feet.

Maundy Thursday: Malcolm Guite is a contemporary English poet, Anglican priest, academic, and larger-than-life singer-songwriter-guitarist. In the sonnet "Maundy Thursday," Guite explores the connections between the institution of the Holy Eucharist, the actions of the four elements of creation (earth, air, fire, and water), the flawed human yearning for God, and God's graceful outreach to us.

Maundy Thursday

Here is the source of every sacrament,
The all-transforming presence of the Lord,
Replenishing our every element
Remaking us in his creative Word.
For here the earth herself gives bread and wine,
The air delights to bear his Spirit's speech,
The fire dances where the candles shine,
The waters cleanse us with His gentle touch.
And here He shows the full extent of love
To us whose love is always incomplete,
In vain we search the heavens high above,
The God of love is kneeling at our feet.
Though we betray Him, though it is the night.
He meets us here and loves us into light.

Good Friday: Christina Rossetti (1830-1894) was an English writer of romantic, devotional, and children's poems. She also wrote the Christmas carols "In the Bleak Midwinter" and "Love Came Down at Christmas." In "Good Friday," she describes a spiritual crisis when she feels unmoved by the Crucifixion, and she worries that her absence of tears betrays an absence of faith. In her desperation, she asks God to strike her stony heart the way that Moses struck the rock in the wilderness (Exodus 17:6, later referred to by St. Paul as a symbol of Christ Himself (I Corinthians 10:4)) to make it pour out water in her tears.



Good Friday

Am I a stone, and not a sheep, That I can stand, O Christ, beneath Thy cross, To number drop by drop Thy blood's slow loss, And yet not weep? Not so those women loved Who with exceeding grief lamented Thee; Not so fallen Peter weeping bitterly; Not so the thief was moved: Not so the Sun and Moon Which hid their faces in a starless sky, A horror of great darkness at broad noon -I, only I. Yet give not o'er, But seek Thy sheep, true Shepherd of the flock; Greater than Moses, turn and look once more And smite a rock.

Holy Saturday: George Mackay Brown (1921-1996), one of the great Scottish poets of the 20th century, refers to a doctrinal event rooted in the Creeds ("...He descended into Hell,") and in a few Scriptural references (I Peter 3:19-20 and Ephesians 4:8, specifically). The day after Christ's Passion and Death on the Cross, Christ descended into the depths of hell (or, Sheol, the Hebrew word for the place of the departed), preached to the souls imprisoned there, and staged a kind of "jail break" to lead them into the Heavenly Realms. Brown works backwards through time to survey six important figures in the Old Testament (Solomon, David, Joseph, Isaac, Abel, and Adam) and how their personalities and experiences anticipated the arrival of Christ. The final two lines emphasize that, like Adam, "the Son of Man will walk in a garden through drifts of apple-blossom," underscoring the fact that Christ is the Second Adam in the new Creation in the life of the Resurrection.



The Harrowing of Hell

He went down the first step.

His lantern shone like the morning star.

Down and round he went

Clothed in his five wounds.

Solomon whose coat was like daffodils

Came out of the shadows.

He kissed Wisdom there, on the second step.

The boy whose mouth had been filled with harp-songs,

The shepherd king

Gave, on the third step, his purest cry.

At the root of the Tree of Man, an urn With dust of apple-blossom.

Joseph, harvest-dreamer, counsellor of pharaohs
Stood on the fourth step.
He blessed the lingering Bread of Life.

He who had wrestled with an angel,
The third of the chosen,
Hailed the King of Angels on the fifth step.

Abel with his flutes and fleeces
Who bore the first wound
Came to the sixth step with his pastorals.

On the seventh step down

The tall primal dust

Turned with a cry from digging and delving.

Tomorrow the Son of Man will walk in a garden Through drifts of apple-blossom.



Easter: George Herbert (1593—1663) was a Welsh-born poet, orator, political figure, and priest who is considered to be one of the best devotional and metaphysical lyricists in the Ages of Shakespeare and Milton. He delighted in word-play, puns, and clever visual poetic structures. This two-stanza work is carefully arranged so that long verses give way to ever-smaller verses and then return to full-length. Life without God shrinks and declines, but then grows and rises when God intervenes in human history at the Resurrection. The stanzas were originally published sideways of facing pages, giving the appearance of actual wings opening, closing, and flapping as one turns the page. The wings to which the poem refers are not the sentimental wings of angels but of birds who, having fallen from the nest, are swept upwards, returned to flight, and soar even higher than before because they fly with the Risen Christ.

Easter Wings

Lord, who createdst man in wealth and store,
Though foolishly he lost the same,
Decaying more and more,
Till he became
Most poore:
With thee
O let me rise
As larks, harmoniously,
And sing this day thy victories:
Then shall the fall further the flight in me.

My tender age in sorrow did beginne
And still with sicknesses and shame.
Thou didst so punish sinne,
That I became
Most thinne.
With thee
Let me combine,
And feel thy victorie:
For, if I imp my wing on thine,
Affliction shall advance the flight in me.

At its best, poetry expresses Truth in ways that are as true as historic or scientific fact but simply express truth differently. Like miracles and liturgies, sometimes the Truth can only be found through mystery, intuition, and soul-deep feeling. In Christ, the Word became Flesh; through Holy Week and at Easter, we rediscover how Christ has re-written our flesh into the words of a New Poem—a poem about joy and sorrow, peace and pain, and life and love eternal with Him.
